Ship Graveyard

Brittany's maritime heritage.

Motoring



As the colder months arrive, drivers in Brittany should prepare their vehicles for the region's damp, chilly weather. A few simple checks can make winter driving safer and help prevent breakdowns on those dark, wet roads.

1. Tires:

Cold weather lowers tire pressure and reduces grip. Check pressures regularly and ensure the tread depth is at least 3mm. In hillier or snowy parts of Brittany, winter tires can make a big difference in handling and braking.

2. Battery:

Batteries lose strength in cold temperatures. Check for corrosion and secure fittings, and have older batteries tested before the first frost. A weak battery can easily leave you stranded on a frosty morning.

3. Wipers & Washer Fluid:

With frequent rain across Brittany, good visibility is vital. Replace worn wiper blades and top up with winter-grade washer fluid to prevent freezing.

4. Coolant & Antifreeze:

Ensure your coolant is topped up and the antifreeze mix is correct — usually 50:50 — to protect your engine from freezing.

5. Lights & Indicators:

Shorter days and stormy weather mean you'll rely more on your lights. Check all bulbs, including brake and fog lights, to stay visible and safe.

6. Keep It Clean:

Road salt and mud can cause corrosion. Rinse your car regularly,

I moved to Brittany in 2016 with my husband. I had been a professional gardener in Suffolk and I was looking forward to being able to grow a whole different range of plants that the Breton climate allows.

As a professional gardener I have an annoying habit of pointing at a plant and telling people around me what its full botanical name is. It's a joke in my profession, where we work you will find the Swear Jar with a few coins in the bottom and then there's the other jar labelled Giving a full botanical name when no-one asked for it. This jar would be full to the top and go towards the staff Christmas dinner at the local pub.

I had envisaged spending my retirement finding plants with interesting

names. I could then stand next to the plant until someone walked by and I could point and say Catalpa bignonioides, that's an Indian Bean Tree, it's a beautiful tree and has an interesting botanical name.

We bought a polytunnel and we were going to grow brassicas under netting. Unfortunately, where I thought the milder climate would help with my growing it also produced a storm that blew the netting away. After having a re-think my husband decided to grow Humulus lupulus in the polytunnel and trained the plants over the hoops. Humulus lupulus is commonly known as hops. We have discovered that my husband is very good at growing hops, which is good because he's also very good at making beer. I'm also very good at drinking it.

The Myth of Ys: Brittany's Sunken City

AlongtheruggedcoastlineofBrittany,France,whispersofalostcityhave endured for centuries. Ys, a magnificent city said to have flourished at the edge of the ocean, remains one of Brittany's most captivating legends — a tale of beauty, sin, and the inexorable power of the sea.

According to the story, Ys was built by King Gradlon, a ruler whose wealth and wisdom made the city prosperous and renowned. The city's protection lay in a remarkable sea wall, complete with a magical gate that controlled the flow of the tides. At the heart of Ys was Dahut, Gradlon's daughter, whose rebellious and pleasure-loving nature would ultimately seal the city's fate.

One fateful day, Dahut, defying her father's warnings, either stole the key to the city gates or opened them in a moment of mischief. The ocean surged through, engulfing Ys and sweeping away its grandeur in a single, catastrophic flood. It has inspired novels, operas, poems, and modern Breton music, keeping the legend alive in both scholarly and popular imagination. Coastal towns like Douarnenez claim ties to Ys, offering visitors museums, exhibitions, and guided walks that celebrate the story. Symbolically, Ys represents the fragile balance between humans and nature, the consequences of unchecked desires, and the enduring mystery of the sea.

Whether viewed as a morality tale, a historical allegory, or a poetic reflection on the human condition, the Myth of Ys endures as a testament to Brittany's rich cultural heritage.






